

A message from the Headteacher



HOW TO REVISE


During the last week of term, Year 11 students and their parents attended our 'How to Revise' evening which included a range of practical information about how best to prepare for their forthcoming examinations. As we approach the summer term there are a number of assessments throughout all year groups and some of the strategies that are regularly discussed with students to develop their long-term memory and support their revision are summarised below.

REMEMBERING

When we learn something new at school we are moving that new information from our working memory to our long-term memory (the learning arrow). We do this through listening carefully and practising. The aim of revision is to retrieve that information from our long-term memory and move it back into the working memory (the remembering arrow) so we can use it in our answers. If we don't complete appropriate revision activities then there is a risk that this information will be forgotten.

ENVIRONMENT

WELLBEING DURING EXAMS



Stress can be a great motivator for some, but for others it can become overwhelming. We have used the analogy of the stress bucket with students in school to help explain how this affects us and how we can help ourselves. In this, the bucket is our stress tolerance, and this differs from person to person. The water is all of the different stresses that we experience; in Year 11, this could be school work, revision, exams themselves, decisions about the future etc. In order that our buckets don't overflow, it is wise to ensure that there are 'taps' or strategies to help us to cope. These include having a healthy sleep routine, getting organised early with a revision timetable, building in time for rest and relaxation and building in techniques such as diaphragmatic breathing and grounding.

RETRIEVAL NOT RE-READING

The best strategies to help us remember information are known as **retrieval activities**. Retrieval activities involve us checking our knowledge without looking at any notes. Many of the revision techniques that students prefer (such as re-reading notes and highlighting), require little mental energy. This is why they feel good. Unfortunately, this also means that they are **unlikely to lead to long term memory development**.

There are **lots of different ways to carry out retrieval practice** and it might look different for different subjects. Some retrieval activities include:

- Completing practice assessment questions
- Self-quizzing using the look, cover, say, write, check method
- The Lietner flashcard method

Online tests, available on websites such as Seneca Learning, MyMaths and BBC Bitesize.

NATIONAL CAREERS WEEK

Building on the success of our Green Careers Week in November, all pupils participated in National Careers Week at the start of March.

Lessons in all subjects featured activities showcasing the wide range of career options linked to each subject area. This was

consolidated during tutor time activities where students participated in a virtual careers fair and were encouraged to explore this in more depth at home. They also considered the skills and attributes that employers are looking for and discussed their own unique skills and attributes. They then moved on to thinking about the things that they can do to build the six most valuable skills to employers. They identified opportunities to do this within the curriculum and extra-curricular activities.

We linked Careers week assemblies to our mission statement, looking at how each individual could 'become the person that God calls us to be' by realising our special gifts and talents and using them in working towards a successful career in the future.


Throughout the term. students have had the opportunity to attend various careers events, including events on Medicine and Psychology at Leeds University, a presentation from BAE systems and a visit to Taylor's of Harrogate.

WORCESTER COLLEGE, OXFORD

A group of 25 Year 11 students visited Worcester College, Oxford, to discover more about the city of dreaming spires and explore possible options for future study. They met with the Senior Admissions and Outreach Officer, who talked to them about the wide range of subjects and societies offered at Oxford and about the lifestyle for students in the city. She also offered advice on choosing subjects and preparing for college and university applications.

We were given a tour of the Worcester College campus by a team of student ambassadors, before embarking on a city tour. The day was an excellent opportunity to explore a range of options for post-16 study and inspired many members of the group to consider applying to study at Oxford. The key message of the day was 'enthusiasm' - ensuring that you choose a subject which you are passionate about, celebrating your own unique talents and being proud of your interests.









COMMON GOOD LEADERS VISITS TO PENNYFIELDS AND BRANDON HOUSE



At Brandon House Care Home, we are building relationships and working to combat loneliness through talking and singing with the residents there. Penny Field is a school for pupils with complex needs. The same group of 9-12 students visit each week to build relationships over time through a combination of board games, sing and sign and other activities.

A few weeks ago, we held an Afternoon Communi-tea for our new friends from across the road to thank them for welcoming us. Our Year 7 and Year 9 Food Technology classes baked scones and cakes and another group of Year 9 students served these, alongside drinks, to our guests. It was a lovely opportunity to strengthen our relationships and meet new friends.

Over 100 students have been involved in visits to Penny Field and Brandon House this year and we hope that many more will join in future visits.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH PRACTICE WALK

Throughout last term, students working towards their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award have learnt how to plan a route, use a map and compass to navigate and began their preparations for their expedition in June.

Last week, 80 students and 11 staff braved sun, rain and even hailstones on a 10km route from Golden Acre Park to Bramhope and back as the students put their learning into practice. Students are now beginning to plan the route for their assessed expedition. This involves learning basic first aid, tent pitching and meal planning to ensure that they are able to be self sufficient over two days of walking and camping in the Yorkshire Dales.

BREARY MARSH

In February 15 students got the opportunity to visit Breary Marsh, a local nature reserve, to work with ranger David Preston on a range of conservation projects. They took part in dead hedging, constructing a natural boundary fence and carrying out repairs from coppiced wood.

Students were very proud of the work they completed, which will support the biodiversity of the area by ensuring that visitors stick to the designated pathways.





YEAR 8 COMPUTING RESIDENTIAL



Over 50 of our Year 8 students went on a fantastic computing residential in London. They explored a range of cultural and technological sites and built strong friendships with all students on the trip. They left school at 8.45am on Friday for the long coach journey to London. On the way, they stopped off at Harry Potter Studios, where they explored the wizarding world of Harry Potter. They spent time interviewing the staff at the studios about their roles and finding out about what happened behind the scenes in the production of the films. Students had their photos taken riding on broomsticks and most people enjoyed a refreshing Butterbeer before getting back on the bus to the hotel.

LONDON IN A DAY

Saturday was a fun-packed day - starting off with a guided tour of Shoreditch, also known as 'East London Tech City', where students learnt more about the history of the area, its development into a thriving technological hub and the wide range of businesses which now call it home. Our students impressed the guide with their insightful questions and boundless enthusiasm, despite the terrible weather.





THE HISTORY OF COMPUTING

From there the group went on to the National History Museum, where they explored the wide range of exhibits and spent their spending money in the gift shop!

In the evening they enjoyed a quick visit to Trafalgar Square followed by pizza in Leicester Square, before walking to the Cambridge Theatre to watch Matilda staff and students were terrified and amazed by Miss Trunchbull and the incredibly talented young actors.

On the Sunday, the coach picked the group up and took them to the National Museum of Computing at Bletchley Park where they enjoyed talks on the Turing-Welchman Bombe (the electro-mechanical device which was developed to crack the Enigma code during the Second World War) and the Colossus (the world's first computer, which was designed to decipher the Lorenz cipher and decode messages between Adolf Hitler and his generals). They also got the chance to see how computing and technology have changed over recent years. They loved playing on retro video games and comparing them to the ones that many of hem have at home.

ESU PERFORMING SHAKESPEARE COMPETITION

At the start of March, we hosted schools from across the region in one of the North East Regional heats of the English Speaking Union's Performing Shakespeare Competition. We were so impressed with the standard of the competition and enjoyed a range of monologues and duologues from different Shakespeare plays.



Our performances came from Beth and Niamh, who impressed the audience with their portrayal of the tender relationship between Juliet and the Nurse in Act 2 Scene 5, and Eryn, who displayed a range of



complex emotions as Helena in Act 3 Scene 2 of A Midsummer Night's Dream. We were delighted when both performances were chosen to progress to the Regional Finals of the competition, which will be held in May.

RAISING OUR VOICES IN THE ESU PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITION

Our public speaking team started the term on a high note, winning their heat of the ESU's Churchill Public Speaking Competition.

Jayden's presentation on his chosen topic 'The Ends Can Never Justify the Means' was named as Best Speech and Lorna took away the prize for the Best Questioner on the night.

They have spent the rest of this term managing their revision and responsibilities in school alongside practising for the regional heat at Dame Allan's School in Newcastle, where they faced students from schools across the North East region.





Jayden's chosen topic for this round was 'The Truth has no Inherent Value' and he explored this through a variety of historical and contemporary examples, including the use of propaganda in Rwanda and Kenya and the impact of AI and so-called 'deep-fakes' on our political and social discourse. Lois expertly chaired for the speaker from St Peter's School, York. Lorna questioned the speaker on their chosen topic.

After a tough evening of discussion the team finished in second place, with Lorna named Best Questioner and Lois Best Chair. Well done to the team!

DEBATING SUCCESS AT THE LEEDS SALON COMPETITION
