CELEBRATING SUCCESS OUTSTANDING 2025 RESULTS -

AMONG THE BEST IN LEEDS AND THE DIOCESE

Last week, the Department for Education (DfE) released the 2025 headline figures for schools on the Compare School and College Performance in England website. Yorkshire Evening Post's report on schools in Leeds can be found here: https://www.yorkshireeveningpost.co.uk/education/top-leeds-secondary-schools-2025-gcse-results-5370259

Our Summer 2025 results place us, once again, among the highest-performing schools in both the City of Leeds and the Diocese. Key highlights include:

- 72.6% of our students achieved a grade 5 or above in English and Maths GCSE the highest of all Leeds secondary schools and across the Diocese.
- An Attainment 8 score of 58 also the highest in Leeds and across the Diocese. This score reflects how well pupils have performed in up to eight qualifications, including English, Maths, three English Baccalaureate subjects (such as sciences, computer science, history, geography, and languages), and three additional approved qualifications.

We are especially proud to be the highest-performing school in Leeds and across the Diocese in these measures for disadvantaged students. The DfE defines disadvantaged students as those who have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) in the past six years, or who are currently or have previously been looked after by a local authority.

These exceptional outcomes are a testament to the dedication of our staff, the commitment of our students, and the strength of our shared Catholic values.

YEAR 8 AND 9 CYBER FIRST AT


LEEDS UNIVERSITY




DEBATING AND PUBLIC SPEAKING

YOUNG GEOGRAPHER OF THE YEAR

The competition invited students to research a number of these islands and present their findings in a poster. The Geography department were impressed with the standard of entries, which included posters about Easter and Christmas islands, Bora Bora, the Maldives and Yesterday and Tomorrow islands. The winning entry in school came from Jacob (Year 7) who won a £15 Amazon voucher and his entry, along with entries from Szianne, Ronan, Edith, Sophie and Maria, was submitted to the judging panel for the national competition. Y8 DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS





CONVERSATIONS WITH OUR COMMUNITY AN INTERVIEW WITH MISS BURNS

For this half term's interview, Junior Librarian Matilda caught up with Miss Burns about her role in school.

How long have you worked here?

This is my 11th year at school and I have worked in various roles, all of them linked to the English department. My main job is in the library and that is where most students will have met me during their library lessons or at lunchtime, but I also work in the PLC with students who are new to English and I run the Duke of Edinburgh scheme in school as well.

What inspired you to do this job?

My mum was a teacher and I always knew I wanted to work with children. I did an English degree and then worked in primary schools for 5 years and it was there that I really became passionate about encouraging young people to develop the love of reading that I had as a teenager.

What's your favourite part of your job?

I love the fact that it is so varied - in a day I can go from library lessons, to English lessons and onto debating club or Duke of Edinburgh after school - but I always say that the 20 minutes I spend with 11LBS every day is my favourite part of the day! I think my range of roles gives me the chance to see most students at their very best - whether that's in a debating competition or competing in sports for the physical section of their DofE. I really enjoy the Duke of Edinburgh expedition every year - it's such a great way for students to show their resilience.

How many books do you read in a month?

I probably read about 6 books every month - I've usually got lots of different books on the go. I've usually got a book on my desk to read during library lessons, then a book that I read at home and an audiobook in the car.

Jacob and I are training for a 54km ultramarathon next year, so I'm doing even more running than usual training for that.


