The report beautifully captures the essence of our school as a place where Christ is truly at the heart of all we do - where faith, learning, and love flourish together, and where each individual is nurtured to become the person God calls them to be, growing in kindness, wisdom, knowledge, and holiness. I am deeply grateful to every member of our wider school community for your unwavering support, partnership, and prayers. We remain committed to our mission: growing together in faith, hope, and love.

Our Year 11 students have begun their GCSE and Level 2 examinations with characteristic dedication and determination. Alongside their academic focus, they have shown remarkable care and support for one another, reflecting the true spirit of our school. Today, we celebrated their journey with a joyful and moving Leavers' Day, including our annual Leavers' Mass attended by students, tutors, and families, followed by a special Leavers' Assembly led by Mr Warren, Head of Year 11. It was a wonderful opportunity to reflect on and celebrate our time together.

I am equally proud of our Year 10 students, who engaged thoughtfully and maturely in the application process for student leadership roles. Congratulations to our newly appointed Head Boy, Oliver, and Head Girl, Tilly. I am confident they will lead with integrity and passion, supported by our new Deputy Head Students and Senior Prefects. They follow an exceptional team, and I extend heartfelt thanks to our outgoing Head Boy, Eoin, and Head Girl, Sophie, for their humble and inspirational leadership. I look forward to seeing the new team continue to build on the strong traditions they inherit.

As this half term comes to a close, we also bid farewell to Mr Moore, who has served the school in various roles, most recently as Cover Supervisor. His impact has been especially felt through his dedication to developing girls' football. This year's outstanding achievement of six trophies is a fitting testament to his efforts. Thank you, Mr Moore, for all you have contributed to our school community.

Earlier this week, our Faith in Action students, accompanied by Mrs Davies, represented our school at St Anne's Cathedral, where they presented a cheque for £2,100 to the Good Shepherd Appeal on behalf of the school. Thank you to everyone who generously supported our Lenten fundraising efforts. I also want to express my appreciation to the staff who are giving up their time during the half-term break to accompany students on the Iceland trip, which departed this morning. When we return, many students will be involved in end-of-year assessments, work experience, the Diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes, and a wide range of educational visits and enrichment activities—alongside their continued academic studies. I encourage all students to embrace these opportunities with enthusiasm and commitment.

This year also marks a special milestone: the 25th anniversary of our school community on this site, and the conclusion of the PFI project during which our site was managed by Bellrock. We are especially grateful to Maureen Kempton, our Facilities Manager, who also celebrates 25 years of dedicated service. Her care and commitment have helped ensure our site remains a welcoming and purposeful place of learning. As our PFI contract comes to an end, we're excited about the new opportunities this brings, including greater flexibility in areas such as catering and increased availability for community lettings across more parts of the school.

# **CHAPLAINCY OUTSTANDING CATHOLIC EDUCATION**

We welcomed inspectors from the Catholic Schools Inspectorate into school this half term. They were in school to ensure that, as a Catholic school, we are doing everything we can to ensure the students have the very best experience and that we are fulfilling the aims of Catholic education.

Over two days the inspectors visited RE lessons, observed form time and assemblies looking at the quality of collective worship (worshipping together), spoke to many students and staff and observed the usual daily routines and life in our school. Thank you to anyone who supported the process in any way, especially if you completed the parental survey. The inspection team based its judgment on 3 key areas of school life; Catholic Life and Mission; Religious Education; Collective Worship.

#### CATHOLIC LIFE AND MISSION

Every time a member of our school community meets with another there is an encounter; how we encounter people, how we listen, speak to them, how we act, how our mission statement is lived out by all members of our school community. These are ways in which the Catholic Life and Mission of our school are demonstrated and could be seen by the inspectors. Within this area the inspectors looked at what our students do to put their faith and our mission statement into action. They reported that "the school's mission statement is fully understood by all members of the school community".



Our students were excellent ambassadors for our school throughout the visit and the behaviour and attitudes they displayed were exemplary, as always. The report notes that our students "understand that they are unique and made in the image of God" and that they appreciate that "staff are helping them to follow Christ's example and value this highly."











By spending time in forms, speaking to groups of students and even accompanying some of our Common Good Influencers on one of their weekly lunch-time visits to Brandon House, they noted that pupils understand the way in which our school virtues are linked to our mission statement and are "aware of the impact of the school mission and its values on their everyday lives both in and out of the classroom."

#### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Over two days, the inspection team visited many RE lessons across all year groups and held discussions with members of the RE team as well as students from KS3 & KS4. During these lesson visits, they saw and experienced the various ways the curriculum in KS3 and KS4 engaged our students and noted that "behaviour and attitudes in the classroom are outstanding". They remarked that relationships between staff and students were "strong" and that all members of the team displayed "comprehensive subject knowledge."





The inspection team looked at a range of student work including exercise books, creative artwork around the school and the work produced in class. They saw discussion works and strong starts to lessons and were particularly impressed by the work students do independently, commenting "Independent learning is a strength of the department. Students take pride in all that they do". Inspectors also commented on our "expertly crafted" RE curriculum which meets the needs of individual students and "engages and inspires" all students to be the person that God calls them to be.

#### COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

Collective worship is any time when members of our school community come together to praise and worship God. At Cardinal Heenan this takes place every morning in tutor time, in assemblies, Masses, liturgies, services, RE lessons and throughout the liturgical year. A number of these were witnessed during the visit including collective worship during form time across several years groups and an especially moving studentled Rosary in the Chapel. The report noted that the Chapel is "at the heart of the school."





The inspection team spoke to several members of staff including Governors and looked at the ways in which, as a school, we provide support to all members of the school staff. They said "Leaders, including Governors, ensure that ample time and resourcing are dedicated to celebration of the word at Cardinal Heenan. This is because all leaders care deeply about the spiritual formation of all members of the community".

Another key element of collective worship events in our school is the opportunity to reflect and discuss the importance and meaning of the liturgy, action or service, and evaluate these through student forums. Inspectors praised the fact that students feel that they have a voice in planning and delivering collective worship in school and can "clearly articulate how their input is used to shape prayer and liturgy".



As Mr Kelly noted in his letter to parents, this outcome belongs to all members of our school community - staff, Governors, students, primary feeder schools, Parishes and you, the primary educators of children, their parents and carers. Your ongoing support, prayers, and partnership in our mission have played a vital role in this success, and we thank you sincerely.

As we celebrate this milestone, we remain deeply committed to continuous improvement and to offering your children a truly excellent and faith-filled education, inspiring excellence in every individual and encouraging everyone in our community to be kind, follow the rules and try your best.

School staff also shared a timeline of events leading up to their examinations in Year 11. These messages have been echoed in Year 10 tutor groups this week. ## **BATTLEFIELDS**

A group of 40 Year 9 pupils and travelled to the Battlefields of France and Belgium in May to visit the

battlefields and memorials to those who gave their lives during the First World War. They travelled on the overnight ferry from Hull to Rotterdam, where they enjoyed some live music and a chance to enjoy a meal together and catch up with their friends before travelling on to their accommodation in Ypres.





This trip is a special pilgrimage offering pupils the opportunity to show their respects to those who lost their lives in the First World War and to gain further understanding of the events of the First World War and how "We Will Remember Them".











Where possible, students are offered the chance to visit memorials of family members around the area and this is always a special moment for staff and students to be able to reflect on the sacrifices made by their relatives. A small group of students also represented our school community in laying a wreath at the Menin Gate during the Last Post ceremony.

# **POLITICS MATTERS**

They took part in a campus tour, learned about studying politics at Leeds Beckett and took part in a social media election challenge. One of our teams won the challenge. # **UKMT JUNIOR MATHS CHALLENGE**

This term, our Year 8 students in Miss Russell's and Ms Millington's class put their Mathematical skills to the test in the UK Maths Trust Junior Maths challenge. Designed to challenge and inspire young mathematicians across the country, the competition features a series of problem-solving questions that push students to think logically, creatively and strategically. Our Year 8 students worked very hard, tackling tricky puzzles and applying their mathematical reasoning under timed conditions.

62.5% of our students that took part received an award, where UKMT only award the top 50% of competitors.

Congratulations to the 23 students who received Bronze, the 15 students who received Silver, and to Daniel and Elma who received Gold certificates - a fantastic achievement. Well done to all students who participated!

# PARTICIPATION IN SPORT

#### **GIRLS FOOTBALL**

Our girls' football teams signed off on this season with an impressive 6 trophies from 7 competitions.

The U12 team won their Leeds Cup final 4-1 against Ilkley with goals from Georgia (hattrick) and Olivia. There was a particularly special moment after this game as the girls were presented with their medals and trophy by Rhys Chadwick and Louie Dudley, both former students who are now playing for Leeds United's academy. Both boys have younger sisters playing in the team.

The U12s followed this up a week later, winning the Merit Table final against Ilkley 5-1 with goals from Sophia (2), Georgia (2) and Olivia. Well done to all teams for their commitment throughout the season.











The U14 team fought back from 2-0 down against Horsforth in the Merit Table final to draw 2-2, with two goals from Jane taking the game to penalties, before agonisingly losing the shoot out 4-3 in sudden death.

The team bounced back a week later with a win in the Leeds Cup final against Horsforth. This was another nail-biting game - this time a 7 goal thriller with our girls emerging 4-3 winners with goals from Jane (hat-trick) and Amelia. Well done to the team for a magnificent season!




#### **BOYS FOOTBALL**

Our boys football teams across all year groups have reached the semi finals of their age group's Leeds Cup or Merit Table competition this year. The Year 9 boys got as far as the final of the Leeds Cup, losing out on penalties in the Festival of Football event against Boston Spa following goals from Will and Max. #### **CRICKET**

Many of the team hadn't played cricket before but represented our school incredibly well, showing commitment and resilience.



#### **DUKE OF EDINBURGH**

Our Year 9 Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award participants are continuing their preparations for their expedition next month. This half term they have planned a menu for the expedition, learnt about risk assessment and basic first aid in an emergency, practised navigation and map reading around our local area and had a go at pitching a tent on school grounds. They have also learnt more about cooking with a Trangia gas stove, how to pack a rucksack to ensure that they have everything they need for the expedition without carrying too much and caring for their tent and other camping equipment to ensure that it is ready to use when they need it.

As well as preparing for the expedition section, students are continuing to work towards the physical, skill and volunteering sections of the award with pupils involved in a huge range of activities, from working with youth groups in their parishes to running sports clubs in school and learning to cook healthy and nutritious meals for their families and friends.











#### **ATHLETICS**

Making the most of the warmer weather, members of the cross country running club have spent the summer season working on their track running. Each week, they work on a particular aspect of running fitness, using a variety of training techniques including interval training and hill work. They often choose to end sessions with a 100m sprint.





They put their hard work in training into practice this week at the first Leeds Athletics League meeting at Leeds Beckett University. Year 9 student Max finished second in the 400m event, competing against Year 10 boys. Our 4x 100m relay team of Ethan, Harry, Will and Max finished third in their event and Year 8 Grace finished third in the 800m.

#### What do you do when you're not in school?


