A message from the Headteacher

As we approach the end of another busy term at school, I would like to recognise the efforts of all staff and students in ensuring that Cardinal Heenan is a happy school, with strong links to our local community.

It is with a heavy heart that I have to start with some bad news. On the evening of Friday 28 March, thieves managed to get over our perimeter fence and steal one of our school minibuses. This is going to cause huge difficulties for us as it means that we will not be able to provide students with transport to some of the incredible opportunities that we offer, so will have to cancel or pause some of them for a while. I am currently in the process of liaising with the insurance company, but it is likely that we will have to carry out significant fundraising in order to replace the minibus. Please watch out for forthcoming fundraising events and support us however you are able to.

Now on to more positive news...

Lent provides us with an opportunity to deepen our relationship with Jesus through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Many of our students have made Lenten promises to themselves and have taken up the many opportunities for prayer and reflection offered by our Chaplaincy team throughout this period. In addition, the school has become a hive of activity throughout this half term, with students designing and leading so many creative ways to raise money for CAFOD and the Good Shepherd Appeal.

It was wonderful to see so many of our primary school pupils and families enjoying all four performances of 'Oliver!' and to receive so much positive feedback about the talents and hard work of the students and staff members who made it possible. As well as performing on stage, students got involved as lighting and sound technicians, prop/costume designers and front of house. Thank you to all who attended and gave so generously to our raffle and bake sales – your support enables us to continue to develop performing arts in school.

This half term also saw a group of dedicated staff give up a weekend to support our Year 7 pupils on their retreat, where they enjoyed time with their peers, developing existing friendships and making new ones. They also had time to reflect and pray, and we were delighted that Fr Yemane was able to join them for part of the weekend and to celebrate Mass with the group.

We also celebrated Culture Week in school. This celebration was started by our head students last year and has been continued by senior students this year. Students took part in a range of activities celebrating the wonderful diversity of our school community – all planned and delivered by the students themselves. Our Year 10 students have started the process of applying for the positions of head students, prefects and senior prefects and they have excellent role models in the form of our current senior leadership team who have shown real commitment to their roles and have focused on the importance of inspiring excellence in younger students. 




Year 11 kicked off the half term with a week filled with sports tournaments, teddy bears and even an interactive arcade-style game which had been designed by Milo in 11JWW.



In the afternoon, we had a tour around Oxford City Centre, seeing iconic buildings which have featured in TV series and films as well as learning more about the unique collegiate structure of the University of Oxford.













PREPARING FOR OUR FUTURE LANGUAGES AT LEEDS UNIVERSITY


Student ambassadors from Leeds University's Modern Languages department came into school in February to talk to Year 9 students about further study. They talked about university life as well as focusing on the opportunities, skills and life experiences that modern foreign languages can bring. Ambassadors also shared details about their own journeys with modern foreign languages, giving an insight into their motivation to pursue further study as well as the doors that languages have opened up for them. After the presentation, pupils had the chance to reflect on potential careers using languages and were able to ask any questions about languages at university or any other aspect of the student experience.





LEEDS CENTRAL LIBRARY

Year 7 students had a great day at Leeds Central Library filming BookTok trailers for the Leeds Book Awards shortlists. Students explored areas of the library not usually open to the public, including the Yorkshire room which includes a range of books written by people from our region, as well as maps and scrapbooks. They then filmed short trailers for the shortlisted titles and used editing software to create a montage of these clips, as well as using specialised sound booths in the library to record voiceovers.







GSAL FUTURES CONFERENCE

A group of Year 10 students attended the Grammar School at Leeds' Futures Conference. This year's theme was 'Image, Impressions and Impact' and students gained valuable insight into a range of careers in new sectors and pathways. Highlights of the day was the fast paced stock market trading games where our students worked with Year 12s from GSAL. Thank you to the Grammar School for inviting us!



CULTURE WEEK

We celebrated our second annual culture week in March. This event is entirely planned and coordinated by our senior students. They prepared assemblies, workshops and tutor time activities and reflections celebrating the great diversity of our school community.



Students led assemblies throughout the week, sharing the things that they are most proud about their culture.

Melody sang a beautiful Farsi song, and Neha said the Our Father in her native language of Malayalam. We had students from Cameroon, Cyprus, Eritrea, Ghana, India, Iran, Ireland, the Philippines, Poland, Nigeria and Zimbabwe all speaking and we learnt so much about their heritage.



We also displayed a world map in the street throughout the week and invited students and staff to add pins showing where they or their families were born or live. It was incredible to see the enormous range of countries which our school community have links with.



We are also consistently ranked within the top 10% of schools nationally for attendance, making us the 11th highest school in Yorkshire on this measure. Thank you to all parents and carers for their support with keeping attendance in school so high. There is a clear link between attendance and attainment and developing positive habits around attendance and punctuality is important in preparing students for careers and future study.
