



Paragraphs, Useful Sentence Starters and Discourse Markers

- A paragraph is a group of sentences on one topic or idea, or something occurring at a certain time or in a certain place.
- Remember to begin a new paragraph every time you change character, place, time or subject/idea.
- Paragraphs are also used to show when the speaker changes in a piece of dialogue. This is sometimes called "new speaker, new line".
- Paragraphs should begin with **a topic sentence** which introduces the key points of what is to follow.
- It is useful to use **DISCOURSE MARKERS (specific sentence starters)** to begin new paragraphs as they can really help to signpost the way for the reader.

Some of the most useful DISCOURSE MARKERS are in the table below – try to use them when you can to improve the organisation and fluency of your writing
